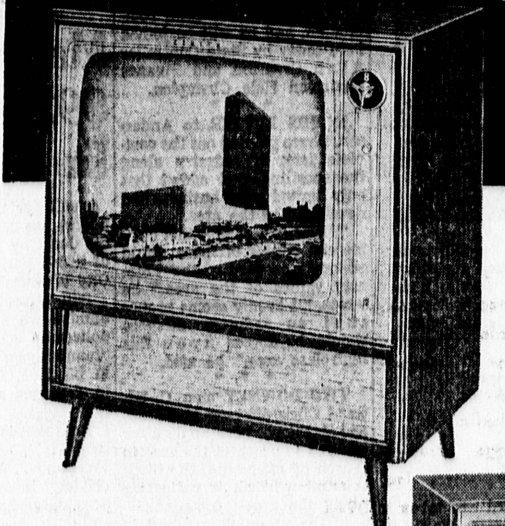

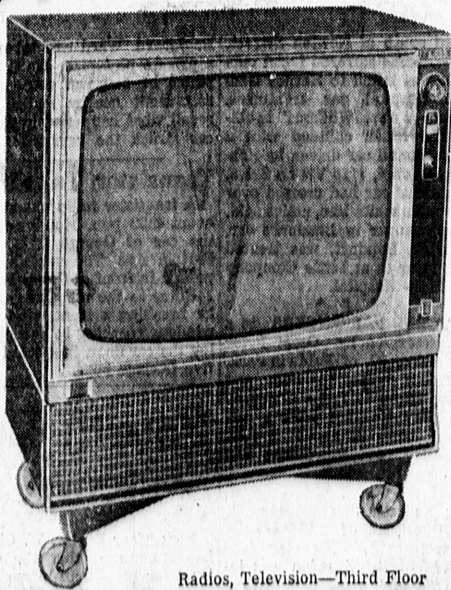

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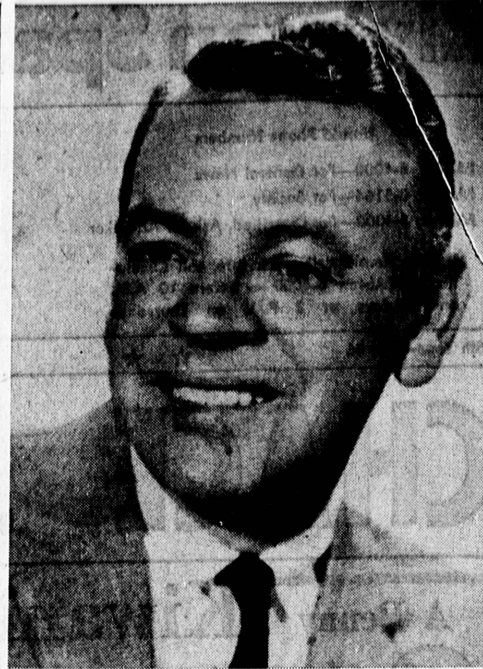

## Local Church Representatives To Attend Medical Discussion

The deep mystery of where science stops and the Spirit begins will be discussed at a three-day medical-ministerial convention at Coronado at which representatives of the Torrance Seventh-day Advent-

ist Church, 1610 Acacia Ave., will be present.

Pastor Glenn Goffar and Dr. Virgil Wood of the local congregation will attend the unusual session, Oct. 27 to 29, at the Del Coronado Hotel near San Diego. Some 1,000 physicians and ministers from Los Angeles, Santa Barbara and Ventura counties will attend the session.

According to Pastor Goffar the convention will discuss "the many inter-relationships of medical science and religion which, when properly integrated, will effectuate a more complete healing process."

Top physicians and clergymen of Loma Linda University's school of medicine and the Seventh-day Adventist Church will discuss the many facets of the basic question how can science and religion combine efforts to aid in healing the "whole man?"

"We anticipate many answers to emerge from this convention which will give the minister and the physician better healing techniques," Pastor Goffar said. "While one does not normally think of the minister as a healer there is little question that his work, combined with proper scientific endeavor, can bring about the most effective type of healing possible."

## Jury Deadlocks At Inquest on Cyclist's Death

Six members of a seven-member coroner's jury thought both a driver of a station wagon and a motorcycle probably were criminally responsible for the death of a 16-year-old South High School student.

The remaining member of the jury said just the motorcycle driver was responsible. As a result of the inquest held at the Hall of Justice in Los Angeles, Torrance police say no further action will be taken.

Rick Berton Scott, of 21905 Linda Dr., passenger on a motorcycle driven by Ronnie William Mathis, 17, of 22715 Anza Ave., was killed Sept. 19 when the motorcycle collided with a station wagon driven by Mary Geraldine Sternberg, 33, of 2041 1/2 Anza Ave. Police said the station wagon was apparently making a left turn into a driveway when the accident occurred.

The accident happened in front of 20418 Anza Ave.

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
