

Peninsula Churches Plan Reformation Sunday Fete

A Reformation Festival Service is being sponsored by the Palos Verdes Peninsula Council of Churches on Reformation Sunday, Oct. 29. The service is to celebrate the beginning of the Protestant Reformation and the liberation of the Christian conscience. This service will involve all the Protestant churches in the Palos Verdes area, and will be the first of such services to be held.

The committee in charge of the service includes Dr. Kenneth Reeves and Mrs. Kenneth Harris from the Peninsula

Council of Churches executive board, The Rev. Hans Holborn and The Rev. Vincent Coletta Jr. from the Ministerial Assn., and Mrs. E. J. Cloherty and Mrs. Thomas Mabin from the choir directors.

THE REV. Hans Holborn, pastor of Riviera Methodist Church, will deliver the sermon on the subject, "Protest Your Faith." Other ministers participating are The Rev. Thomas Gibson of St. Luke's Presbyterian Church; The Rev. Dr. Albert King of Neighborhood

Church, and The Rev. Vincent Coletta Jr. of the First Baptist Church.

Special music chosen for the service from the Reformation Period includes the anthem with organ and trumpet, "All People That On Earth Do Dwell" by Ralph Vaughan Williams.

THE FESTIVAL Choir will be composed of singers from the individual church choirs, including St. Luke's Presbyterian, St. Peter's by the Sea Presbyterian, Riviera Method-

ist, Neighborhood Congregational Christian, St. Francis Episcopal, First Baptist, Rolling Hills Methodist, and Rolling Hills Covenant. Mrs. Thomas Mabin, choir director at St. Luke's Presbyterian Church, will direct the Festival Choir, and will be assisted by Mrs. Lester Kim, organist, and Milton Asher, trumpeter.

The Festival Service will be held Sunday evening at 7 at the First Baptist Church of Palos Verdes, Palos Verdes Drive North at Rancho Vista School.

The Del Amo Southern Baptist Church has announced the purchase of a permanent church site for its new congregation at 226th Street and Ocean Avenue, adjoining the Riviera Hospital. Total consideration for the property was \$60,000.

The pastor, Daniel B. Weaver Jr., of 4010 Torrance Blvd., states that the congregation is made up of members living in the Del Amo Center area and adjoining communities, and is one of the 30,000 new churches and missions being founded by the Southern Baptist Convention by 1964.

THE CONVENTION, America's fastest growing major denomination, now has 33,000 churches with over 10,000,000 members. Baptisms average over 400,000 annually.

William J. Mountz, 22102 Ocean Ave., is chairman of the church building committee. Builder Kirk Gillett, with offices at 1508 Crenshaw Ave., will be the general contractor in charge of construction of the future worship center.

Temporary worship is being conducted at 317 South Broadway, Redondo Beach.

Volunteers Dedicated At Services
