Co-Rec Club Names Group Civic Symphony Concert To Present Varied Show

The Torrance Co-Recreation Club, for seventh and eighth graders, sponsored by the Recreation Department, announces selection of its 1961-62 steering committee.

Conductor Elise Aehle has chosen an extremely interesting program for the Civic Symphony's concert on Wednesday evening at Redondo High School Auditorium at 8:15. Representing, as it does, some of the highest points of musical achievement, it will bring a cross-section of the great music of the 19th and 20th centuries to local music lovers.

The program will open with Beethoven's Second Symphony. Certain commentators have said that "this is the culminating point of the world of Schubert, Haydn, and Mozart; that

it is the farthest point to which Beethoven could go before he burst into that wonderful new region which no man had as yet explored, of which no man had ever dreamed."

SOLOIST Robert DeSimone, son of Mr. and Mrs. John DeSimone of Hermosa Beach, will play the much-discussed Concerto for the Left Hand by Ravel. This is seldom heard because of its almost insurmountable difficulty.

Apparently these are only one copy of this orchestration available in this country and it

was obtained by the Civic Symphony with great effort and expense barely a week and a half before the concert date, leaving the orchestra only two rehearsals to prepare this very complicated score. The concerto by France's greatest master of the second and third decades of the 20th century, Maurice Ravel, is a glowing example of his mastery of orchestral color and piano technique.

FOR THE closing numbers Maestro Aehle has turned to England's most honored mod-

ern composer, Benjamin Britten, for "Matinee Musicales," a Suite of Five Movements from Rossini. These are charming and brilliant, full of amusing harmonies and rhythms, all as new as tomorrow.

Since 1945 the Civic Symphony Orchestra has given from four to eight free programs each season to the South Bay. It has grown during this time from a small amateur group to the present orchestra of professional grade musicians, most of whom, including the conductor, are your neighbors and friends.
