Chief Warns Of Halloween Fire Perils

"Tricks or treats." Through-out the country Tuesday thousands of youngsters will be going door to door chanting this familiar slogan. They are happy and carefree so let's keep them that way, Battalion Chief Paul Schneider of the Los Angeles County Fire Department, said yesterday.

Along with the gaiety, fun, and festivity of the Halloween celebration lurks that terrible goblin — fire — so again this year fire officials request that all safety measures be taken to prevent children from suffering burns and possible loss of life.

REMEMBER, you can't flame-proof a child, Schneider said, but you can insure reasonable fire safety by following these simple rules:

- Do not use highly flammable material for Halloween costumes.
- Parents are warned to be very cautious about purchasing or allowing children to buy and wear masks or other costume articles which are highly flammable or of a material which can be easily ignited.
- Use only decorative materials, crepe paper, etc. which are flameproofed.
- Be exceptionally careful with candles in Jack-O-Lanterns. Use flashlights if possible.
- Provide ample adult supervision for all activities.
- If small children are left at home, make certain they are cared for by a competent babysitter.

Chief Schneider concluded by wishing all the children a happy and fire-safe Halloween and asked all parents to make certain they know the number of their local fire department if, unfortunately, fire does occur.

Civic Symphony to Give 79th Concert Wednesday

The public is invited to attend, free of charge, the second concert of the 1961-62 season of the Civic Symphony, scheduled for 8:15 p.m. Wednesday in the Redondo High School Auditorium, at Pacific Coast Highway and Diamond Street.

This will mark the 79th performance of the Civic Symphony Orchestra under the baton of maestro Elyse Aehle, who brought her musical magic to the area in 1945. One of the first women in the world to become a regular civic symphony conductor, maestro Elyse has recently received an invitation to perform as guest conductor in South America. She also revealed that she is currently being requested to become permanent conductor of three other symphony orchestras.

"If I should take on another orchestra, it would only be in conjunction with this one," she stated. "Too much of my life and heart are here. Music and the area are a part of me, and I would never give it up."

Following the long-established policy of providing a showcase for local talent, maestro Elyse is presenting Robert De Simone, of Hermosa Beach, as featured soloist in the Wednesday concert. A prize-winning pianist of the University of Southern California, De Simone is receiving special leave from his current Army Reserve training at Ft. Ord, to make his debut as a concert artist.

in his home town. He will play Ravel's "Concerto for the Left Hand," a difficult and exciting performance of piano technique.

Wednesday night's concert will open with Beethoven's "Second Symphony," which maestro Elyse terms "the climax of the age of Haydn and Mozart, demonstrating Beethoven's might as a Titan of music." After composing this symphony, she explained, Beethoven turned toward a different style, achieving new heights as the forerunner of the modern movement.

The second number will be the featured soloist pianist Robert De Simone, who is the son of John De Simone, well-known market owner of this area.

Finale of the concert will be "Matinées Musicales," by Benjamin Britten. This suite of five movements from Rossini is a difficult orchestral performance, clever and modern in style.
