Altrusa Club Joins In Grants-In-Aid Project

During October, the Altrusa Club of Torrance, Iris Ekstrand, president, joins the 500 other Altrusa clubs in eight countries contributing to Altrusa International's annual Grants-in-Aid fund drive.

Since the beginning of Grants-in-Aid in 1945, Altrusa, through members' donations, has awarded \$237,552 in emergency gift grants of \$250 to \$750. These grants have helped 379 graduate women of Asia and Latin America, enrolled in courses in North American universities, over the financial hump toward their educational goal. The allocation for 1961-1962, as determined by last year's fund-raising drive, is \$28,787, according to Rose Fenn, publicity chairman for the Torrance club.

Far too many students come

to study in North American universities only to find their everyday expenses — such as food and rent — too high, and often have to return home without the valuable degree they and their countries so vitally need.

Therefore, from the inception of Altrusa Grants-in-Aid, money has been given to these international students as a supplementary sum. In 1954, the Grants-in-Aid project earned for Altrusa International, the George Washington Honor Medal, awarded by the Freedoms Foundation.

Altrusa, with a current membership of 16,000, is the oldest of the classified women's service clubs, and the first organization for business and professional women, founded April 11, 1917.

Mrs. Robert Hagenbaugh, 1011 Felbar, new president of the Torrance Council PTA is today's guest cook in the HERALD's Favorite Recipe column.

The Hagenbaughs have lived in Torrance for the past 10 years coming from Los Angeles. Mr. Hagenbaugh is a native of California.

They are the parents of three children, Ronald, 17, senior at Torrance High school; Richard, 10, in the fifth grade at Madrona, and Robin, 8, a third grader at Madrona.

Mr. Hagenbaugh is a sergeant with the Los Angeles Police Dept. and is a captain in the Air Force Reserve at March Air Force Base.

As is typical of the young families who make up the majority of the population in this area, both Mr. and Mrs. Hagenbaugh have been active in Scout work at Madrona school for several years and both have worked with the Torrance Central Little League.

Mrs. Hagenbaugh is a Brownie troop leader and for the past six years she has been active in PTA and was elected Council president last spring.

The family attends the Torrance First Christian Church. Voted tops by her family, are the three following recipes Mrs. Hagenbaugh shares with HERALD readers today.

7 BONE ROAST BARBECUED

2 cloves of garlic minced
2 teaspoons oil
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
Sauté garlic in oil, add mustard, soy sauce, rosemary, wine vinegar. Marinate roast 24 hours, turning at least four times. Remove roast and add 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, 2 tablespoons catsup and 1 tablespoon A-1 sauce. Use this for basting roast which can be placed on barbecue grill or in broiler. It should be turned every five minutes and cooked about 25 minutes a side for medium cooked roast.

ENCHILADA CASSEROLE

1 dozen tortillas
1 can chopped olives
1 pound ground meat
1 pound cheese
2 cans (303) or
Brown ground meat, add onions and olives. Alternate layers of tortillas, meat mixture, sauce, cheese, onions, etc., ending with sauce, meat and cheese. Cook 350 degrees.

BANANA NUT CAKE (3 Layer or Loaf)

2 1/2 cups sugar
3/4 cup butter
2 1/2 cups sifted flour
1 1/2 cups mashed bananas (ripe)
1 1/2 cups nut meats
Cream butter and sugar, adding eggs, mashed bananas, sour cream, and nuts, beating well after each addition. Sift flour, salt, and baking powder together and add to mixture. Dissolve soda in little water and add to cake. Bake 325 degrees for 45 minutes or until done. Cake is quite brown when done, and can be served warm or cooled and frosted with butter frosting.

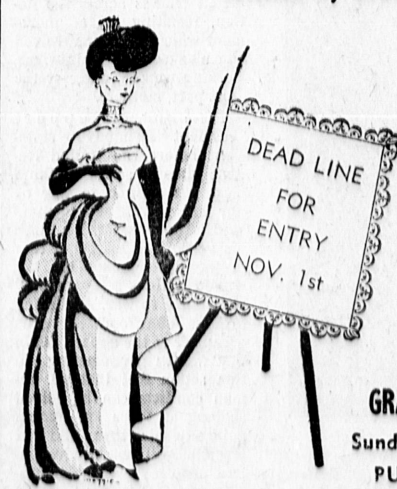

bride-elect opened her shower of gifts.

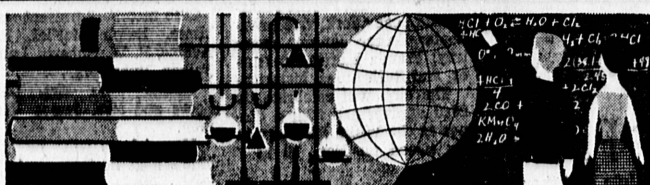
