Mr. and Mrs. Travis flew to San Jose last weekend to be present at the Homecoming parade and game.

Thirty girls were nominated for the title. 15,000 students voted, eliminating 20 nominees. The remaining 10 girls were judged by a panel. Five of these were eliminated and from the remaining five the queen and four princesses were named.

Miss Travis, reigning "Miss San Jose," was crowned at a Coronation Ball at San Jose civic auditorium before a crowd of 1,000.

The princesses entered the large auditorium and passed under an arch of highly polished sabres formed by Air Force and Army ROTC drill teams.

Accompanied by the music of Dick Reinhardt's orchestra, the princesses took positions on a dance floor stand. The Queen was announced by Donnie Corbin, homecoming committee queen chairman.

The coronation began a busy week for the queen and her princesses, posing for photographers, visiting San Jose merchants and participating in judging of Homecoming parade floats and window displays.
