Garden Checklist

- 1. All blooming blubs, except the earliest Cape bulbs such as freesias, may still be planted.
- 2. Snails and slugs are active during cooler weather. Bait for them frequently.
- 3. Plant perennials. Nurseries have a good supply of flat-grown perennial seedlings this month.
- 4. Make a second planting of ranunculus and anemones. Staggered plantings will lengthen the bloom next spring.
- 5. Plant camellias for winter color. You can shop for them as they come into bloom, which means any time up to spring. Each week brings new varieties
