R. Klotz, Junior past president, of Palos Verdes Estates, is in charge of the show.

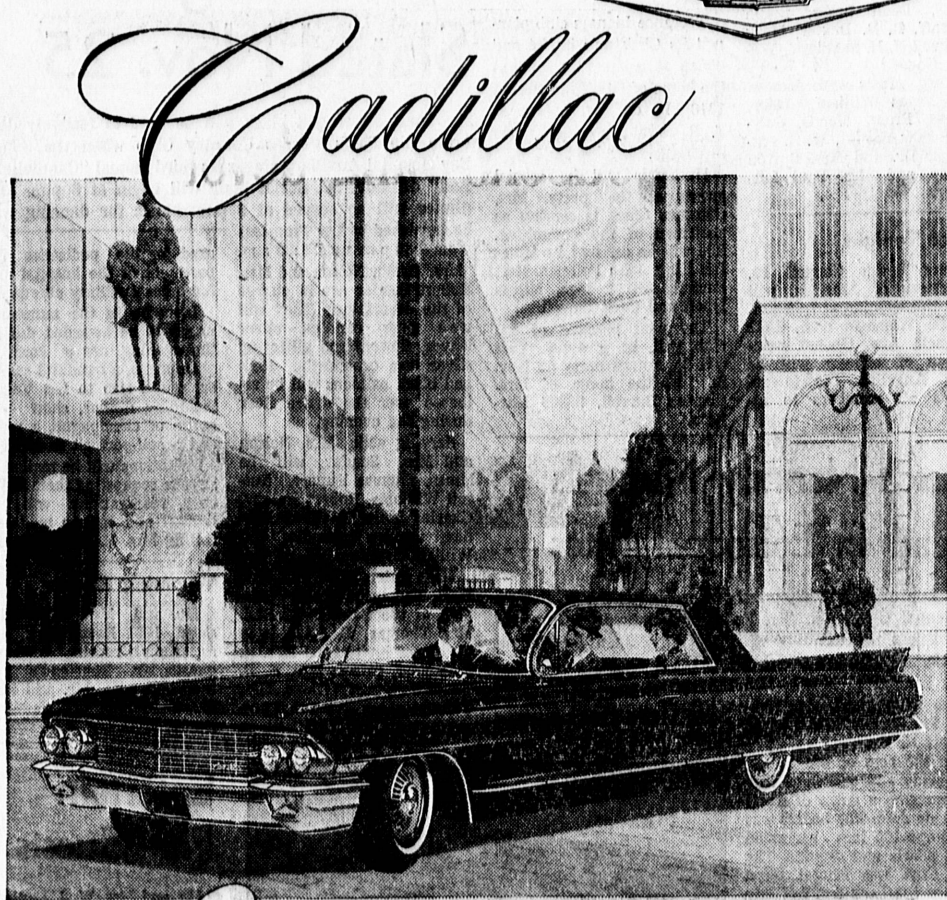
Local Choir Entertains Marina Meet
