Origami, which is characterized by square or triangular pieces of paper folded into straight lines and accurate angles, dates back from the 12th to 14th centuries in Japan, known as the Heian period. The art has been handed down by Japanese mothers to their children for many generations and every well-educated child in Japan is an expert.

Origami has many modern decorative uses, including popular mobiles.



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
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
