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During This Week

Nov. 12, 1864 — Harper's Weekly, New York City, published a "Don't Swap Horses" theme cartoon, which became an American political slogan. It showed a horse, with Lincoln's face, carrying a rider labeled "American Public" across a stream. John Bull (Britain) pointed backward to Gen. George McClellan, whom Lincoln had defeated, asking the rider why he hadn't tried the other horse. "Public" replied that Abe was dependable.

Nov. 13, 1749 — Benjamin Franklin was appointed president of the initial colonial higher learning academy, the Academy and College of Philadelphia, which he had founded. On Sept. 13, 1791, the state legislature unified it and the Charitable School of Philadelphia into the University of Pennsylvania.

Nov. 14, 1878 — The American Humane Assn. adopted its constitution at Baltimore, and became the first recognized humane society in America.
 Nov. 15, 1681 — America's original court report in shorthand was made by Council Clerk John Llywellin, Provincial Court, St. Johns, Md., who had been commissioned by Lord Charles Calvert Baltimore. Gov. Josias Fendall was fined 40,000 pounds of tobacco and banished from the colony for rousing discontent among settlers.
 Nov. 16, 1856 — John C.

Breckinridge, future vice president, asked James Buchanan, newly elected 15th U.S. president, why he didn't marry. Buchanan told his friend, "I can save money by remaining single. My niece, Harriet, will serve as hostess, for the honor only."
 Nov. 17, 1800 — The second session of the Sixth U.S. Congress became the first congress to meet in Washington, D.C. Three new states—Vermont, Kentucky and Tennessee—were represented. The session ended March 3, 1801.



BEST BUYS FOR THE WEEK

Since the first Thanksgiving Day turkey has been the traditional feast. It still is. But today's turkey is available year-round and in sizes to fit every

size family. Growers are now producing bigger, meatier turkeys in less time, with less feed and labor.

Turkey can be bought to feed 2 or 20 people. And it is priced to fit any food budget. Small families, with small ovens, require small turkeys. In answer, USDA scientists produced the Beltsville White Turkey.

EVEN BEFORE this the demand for more white meat resulted in the broad-breasted turkey. And besides that scientists have met the demand for turkeys with shorter legs, compact bodies, more meat, less bone, faster growing, tender juicy, well-finished, no pinfeathers, and pleasing appearance.

Turkey is a year-round favorite. We eat more turkey... 20 years ago we ate about three pounds per year. Now we each eat more than seven pounds every year.

So from Pilgrims to the present, Americans have enjoyed turkey for Thanksgiving... and now throughout the year. If our demands change, the industry will fill the demand. Science will provide the type of turkey consumers want.

BUY PLENTY. When you are planning your feast provide generous servings of turkey. Allow at least a pound per person. This will leave nice meaty portions for following meals... and those planned overs.

Of course, you'll remove the stuffing, take the meat from the bones, and refrigerate promptly after the meal, and if you plan to hold the turkey more than a day or two, freeze it.

THE CALIFORNIA turkey growers have sponsored a research study which reports on time, temperature and palatability tests of roast turkey.

Temperature? You'll be interested to note that the tests determined that 325 degrees F. was the most suitable oven temperature for roasting turkeys up to 16 pounds. For the larger birds, those over 16 pounds, 300 degrees F. was found best.

Breast up or breast down? It depends upon what's most important to you... flavor or appearance. The taste panel indicated that the majority of tasters preferred both the white and dark meat of the turkeys roasted breast down. But these birds lacked the traditional overall golden brown appearance... and some tasters regarded this as a definite disadvantage.

STUFFED? UNSTUFFED? Little significant difference in roasting time between stuffed and unstuffed turkeys. There was also very little difference in losses between stuffed and unstuffed birds. The stuffed birds understandably had less total losses... the stuffing absorbed some of the drippings, but the difference was extremely slight.
