With the approach of the holiday season and the traditional turkey as the entree for the holiday feast, Mrs. A. B. Cowie, 18516 Mansel, was asked for recipes of dishes to complement the turkey, giving area housewives a new and interesting menu for the holiday dinner.

Mrs. Cowie has lived in the South Bay area for the past 21 years. Her ability with the culinary arts can be proven by her three daughters, Mrs. T. W. Eatmon, Holbrook, Ariz.; Mrs. C. A. Harris, Torrance; Mrs. D. A. Eagles, Manhattan Beach, and her six grandchildren.

Just recently Mrs. Cowie was elected to serve her third term as chairman of the South Bay Homecrafters Group, formerly known as the El Nido

Extension Group, sponsored by UCLA.

She has been a member of the Volunteers for Children at Harbor General Hospital for the past five years and has served as parliamentarian and party chairman for two years. Mrs. Cowie is a member of the board of the Belvedere Mutual Water Co.

The guest cook in today's Favorite Recipe column, is a past president of the Perry PTA, past president of the Torrance Council PTA; is charter president of the North High PTA and has been a Brownie and Girl Scout leader for the past eight years.

Mrs. Cowie has chosen three recipes to share with HERALD readers, a salad, a casserole and an orange garnish for the turkey platter.

THREE BEAN SALAD

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|-------------------------|-----------------------------------|
| 1 can yellow wax beans | 1/2 cup vinegar |
| 1 can green beans | 1/2 cup sugar |
| 1 can kidney beans | 1/2 teaspoon celery salt |
| 1 teaspoon salt | 1 green pepper, cut up (optional) |
| 1/2 teaspoon onion salt | |
| 1/2 cup salad oil | |

More seasoning may be added according to taste.

Drain kidney beans and discard juice. Drain other beans and add to oil, vinegar, sugar and seasoning to make a marinade.

Place drained beans in bowl and add marinade to cover. Make this day or evening before serving. Place in refrigerator. When ready to serve, line a bowl with lettuce leaves and add beans (drained). Serves 6 to 8.

SWEET POTATO CASSEROLE

Cook 4 to 6 medium sweet potatoes until done but not overcooked.

Arrange layers of sliced cooled sweet potatoes and broken walnuts in a shallow baking dish.

Make a sauce of 1 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup orange juice, 1/2 cup butter or oleo, 1 tablespoon of cornstarch. Bring to boil and cook 3 minutes. Pour sauce over potatoes and walnuts. Bake in moderate oven 30 minutes.

GLACED ORANGE HALVES

| 6 medium sized oranges | 2 1/2 cups sugar |
| 1 quart water | tart jelly |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | |

Cut oranges in half; arrange halves in large enough pan to hold all halves so that they touch one another. Pour in the water (just enough to come up level with the tops of orange halves). Sprinkle with salt and cover, cook until peel is tender (about 35 minutes). Sprinkle the sugar over the oranges, cover again, and simmer for 30 minutes, or until syrup is almost absorbed. You should not have more than 1 cup of syrup left.

Chill and add a bit of bright jelly in the center of each and arrange around turkey for garnish, or place in low sherbert glasses and pour a little syrup into the center of each half. When chilled add a bit of jelly. Serves 12.
