PARENTS NEED NOT SUBMIT THEIR CHILDREN TO POLIO SHOTS AT SCHOOLS

Despite the passage of a bill imposing compute a Galif, school children, no parent need submit children, no parent need o not wish to do so. The Health Federation remi Federation reminded citizens today.

The bill AB 1940 which was passed during the 1961 State Legisla tive session, prohibits any student, minor on adult from being



Exception is made, however, in the case of adult students or parents who object to the vaccination on the grounds that they are contrary to his or her beliefs. The objecting student, or parent if the student is a minor, may gain exemption from the new law by filing a letter with the governing authority of the school or school district stating that pollo viccinations are AGAINST HIS BELIEF.

In three states where compussory immunization laws have been passed without such exapte clauses, said Fred J. Hart, National Health Federation President, THE INCIDENCE OF POLIO HAS INCREASED 200 TO 300 PER CENT. The National Health Federa-tion, Hart said, also opposes polio vaccinations because:

It has been found that the monkey kidneys from which the vaccine is made contains a virus WHICH CAUSES CANCER when injected into mice. See business week, June 17, 1961.

2. While the nation has been vaccinating 60% of the population with the Salk Vaccine, the percentage of victims of paralytic polio has increased from 25% to 76% of the total contracting polio. This means that paralysis of all, or part of the body, increased from 25% to 76% AFTER THE CHILDREN GOT THEIR SHOTS.

3. Polio vaccine contains penicillin and it has been established that about 10% of the people are alergic to penicillin, and

4. The pollo vaccine contains formaldehyde, the effects of which is not yet known except THE FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRA-TION IS TRYING TO KEEP IT OUT OF OUR FOOD AND DRINK.
