

Of the 43,912 voters registered within the city of Torrance, 26,126 a re Democrats and 16,167 are Republicans, Hite said, The balance are reg-istered for minor parties or decline to state a preference.

Democrats continue to hold
more than a 2-to-1 lead over Republicans in the 17th Congressional District, with 98,076 persons preferring the Democrats
and 38,405 registering as Republicans. Total registration is
141,039. Congressman Cecil R.


