

Area Civil Defense Director At Meeting of Homeowners

Capt. Joseph J. Rochefort, director of Civil Defense for Area G, which includes Torrance, was principal speaker Monday evening as members of the Hollywood Riviera Homeowners Assn. met at the Parkway Elementary School.

The mobility of the Los Angeles area was cited as the biggest problem facing Civil Defense officials in this area, Captain Rochefort told the Rivierans.

THE OFFICIAL also said in-

dividual home fallout shelters would be the best answer "at this time, in the absence of any plan for community shelters." He stressed the difference between fallout shelters and bomb shelters, pointing out that the former were designed only to protect individuals from the harmful effects of radiation. A lively question and answer period followed Captain Rochefort's talk.

Among items discussed during the business portion of the

agenda Monday was beautification of Palos Verdes Boulevard and parking on Camino de las Colinas.

TOM ROACH, vice president of the organization, told of progress to date on improving the appearance of Palos Verdes Boulevard through the Riviera.

The group will continue efforts to persuade the city to install a sprinkling system and permit volunteer groups to

provide the planting with the city's approval.

Robert Sullivan, corresponding secretary of the group, spoke of parking on Camino de las Colinas, saying the city's fire department was going to make a study of the matter. Rivierans have complained that parking on both sides of the narrow street restrict its full use.

PLANS FOR a youth center in El Retiro Park, which

have been advanced by the Riviera Rotary Club, were discussed again, and the Home-

owners Assn. voted to delay support of the project until more facts can be made available. In the meantime, Jim Guillet, who reported on the matter, suggested that the Recreation Department study the proposal to determine if the need really exists for a center in El Retiro.

It was indicated later that some of the residents near

the park questioned the advisability of such a facility.

RIVIERANS also were reminded of the area Christmas decoration contest. Chairman Lee Shade said all homes in the Hollywood Riviera would be judged. Selection of a panel of judges is underway, he said.

Judging will begin on Dec. 21 and final judging will be Dec. 23. Trophies will be awarded in four categories:

most effective use of lights, religious theme, best block area, and for originality. Winners will receive trophies at the January meeting of the sponsoring Riviera Homeowners.
