Pacific Telephone Spends One-Third Million for Phones

C. O. Lindeman, president of Pacific Telephone, said Tuesday his company spent almost \$330 million for expansion and improvement of service in California in 1961. Although business generally cut back its construction in 1961 because of the 1960-1961 recession, Lindeman said Pacific Telephone maintained its program without cuts. "Our current plans," he added, "call for spending about \$375 million in 1962."

Lindeman expressed confidence in the basic soundness of the economy and the prospects for continued growth in the West in the year ahead. "A construction program of the size contemplated for 1962," Lindeman said, "will contribute to full employment and increased personal incomes, not just in our business, but in other industries throughout the state."

MAJOR ITEMS in Pacific Telephone's 1962 program, covering approximately 1,200 communities, were described as follows:

New installations and additions to central office equipment will run about \$105 million.

Expenditures for land and buildings needed to take care of growth will amount to \$30 million.

Outside plant, the wire and cable network that ties telephone users to each other and to central offices, will be expanded at a cost of \$90 million.

New telephones, switchboards for business use, and other equipment will cost about \$150 million.

REVIEWING 1961 operations, Lindeman reported a gain of 371,000 telephones, bringing the total in service at year-end to about 6,750,000.

He said that direct distance dialing had been extended to about three-fourths of the company's customers, and that long distance business had increased about 7 per cent.

Lindeman pointed out that Pacific Telephone's state and local tax bill is now the largest in California. The company's total tax payments to federal, state and local governments amounted to some \$237 million. This was \$21.5 million more than in 1960, and almost four times what it was 10 years ago.

BELL SYSTEM employees, including Pacific Telephone, Western Electric and AT&T people who live and work in California, will receive about \$415 million in wages this year.

Lindeman said total purchases of goods and services from some 2,500 suppliers in 200 locations will amount to about \$175 million for the year.

OTHER EVIDENCE of growth:

Local and long distance calls, combining those completed over Pacific Co. lines and those fed into the nationwide Bell System network, are expected to total 7.7 billion in 1961. This tops the previous year's volume by 300 million.

"Wrapped up in this small package of big figures is a brief story of Pacific Telephone's stake in the future of California, and of the importance of Pacific Telephone to California. The future," Lindeman concluded, "can be just as bright as private enterprise is encouraged to make it."

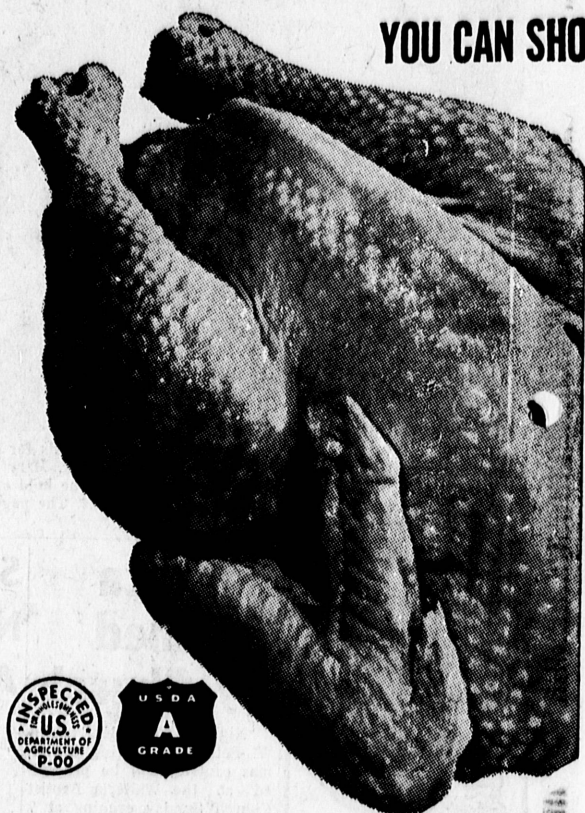
