Two Courses Satellites Meet Today Presented by The Broadway

Mrs. John Thuss, Conservation chairman, is collecting "Pennies for Pines," a very important project, to rehabilitate forests that have been ravaged by fire.

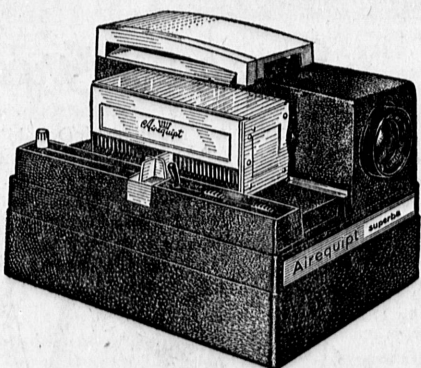

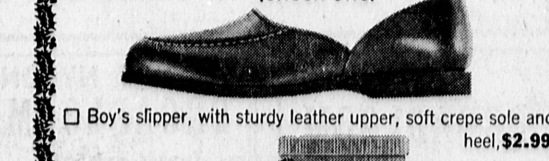

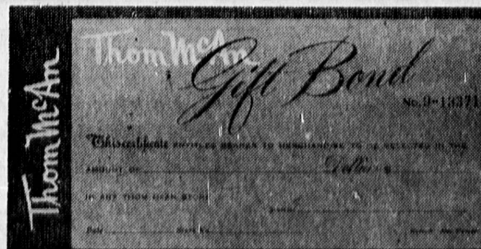
