"It was quite by accident," she says.

During rehearsals for the play, Julie was encouraged by her director to take some acting courses at UC during the next year. That she did, and after several classroom scenes, she decided to read for a part in the University

"I didn't realize what a great responsibility it would be, or the seriousness of the University Theater," she re-called. After the first reading, Julie was quite upset, and almost didn't "go back for call-backs." She hadn't wanted anything more than a small part in the play, but after several readings, the after several readings, the director cast her in the title role of Ondine. Weeks of rehearsal ended in six success ful performances of the play, to which critics throughout the San Francisco area re-

sponded favorably.
Since that first successful appearance last year, Julie has appeared in the title role of Tennessee Williams one-act "Lord Byron's Love Let-ter," and has been working behind the scenes of several University Theater productions. When she returns to

the Cal campus next week, she will play Ophelia's mad scene from "Hamlet." Julie is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles W.
