IN ALL MY experience I have never before played with a lady conductor. Since I joined the Civic Symphony it seems to me that Maestro Aehle has something which men conductors do not possess, and always with a smile that takes the hard strain and nervousness away from the musicians. She is relaxed and can give a better performance. In other words, she hypnotizes her orchestra perhaps through her femininity and obtains the results she wants. At the same time Maestro Aehle can be hard as steel if the music demands it.
