

Riviera Student Tells of Experiences in Turkey

American Field Service Chapter chairman Mrs. John Walti of Hollywood Riviera announces that A.F.S. exchange students made their first speeches locally last week. Ann Coulter, 17-year-old daughter of Lt. Col. and Mrs. Richard Coulter of 4606 Paseo de las Tortugas, spoke at Perry Elementary School last Thursday about her experience in Istanbul, Turkey, under the Americans Abroad program of the A.F.S. Her talk was accompanied by colored slides.

Armando Madrazo from Tucuman, Argentina, spoke at South High School before the Spanish Club. He is also scheduled to tell about his native country at a meeting of the Madrona School PTA. While here, Armando is living with the Richard Bullingtons of 409 Via Colusa in the Riviera. A senior at South High, Armando speaks English very well and says he is enjoying American food — especially hamburgers and milk.

Milk, though not scarce in Argentina, is used mainly in coffee and not as a table beverage, he says. **TAKING** trigonometry, American history, drafting, and leadership in addition to required subjects, Armando will be graduated here in June. After a tour of the United States this summer with other A.F.S. students, he will fly from New York back to Argentina where he hopes to study engineering.
