

In 1959 Charlie reached his peak. He completed 194 pa sses for 1,705 yards. The Glants won the Eastern championship. The fans showered him and his wife with \$25,000 worth of stuff. Charlie took it and said, "I thank you all for sticking with me."

And a few days later, when the Giants lost the National League championship to the Baltimore Colts, a New York paper ran the headline, "Age Catches Up With Conerly."

This last year was a tepid one for Charlie, largely because of another old man about five years his junior, Mr. Y. A. Tittle.

Mr. Tittle, who wasn't good enough to play with the San Francisco 49ers last season, was traded to the Giants, where he slaved in obscurity as The Most Valuable Player of the Year. He also took over Conerly's job.

Charlie's down in Alligator right now, thinking about whether he should stop playing football, and talking it over with his wife, who's a pretty good sports writer.

I hope he quits while he's still an old pro.




