Lahm Ajeey (Meat Pie)

Make dough with yeast, flour and water, thick enough to be handled. Let rise for two hours, then cut in small circular pieces.

Filling:

1 lb. ground round
1 onion (chopped salt and pepper
3 pieces garlic Pine nuts (20 or 25)
Mix all ingredients well. Place one tablespoon of mixture on each circular piece of dough. Flatten with hand. Bake in hot oven until dough is crisp, about 30 minutes.

Flafil

(Appetizer)

lb. Garbanzo 6 pieces garlic 1 bunch parsley 3 tablespoons flour (soak overnight) potatoes

Grind all ingredients with a meat grinder. Mix well. Add salt and pepper to taste. Add 1 tablespoon cameyon, two teaspoons baking powder and mix again. Make round balls, about half the size of a walnut. Drop in hot Wesson oil, cook until brown.
