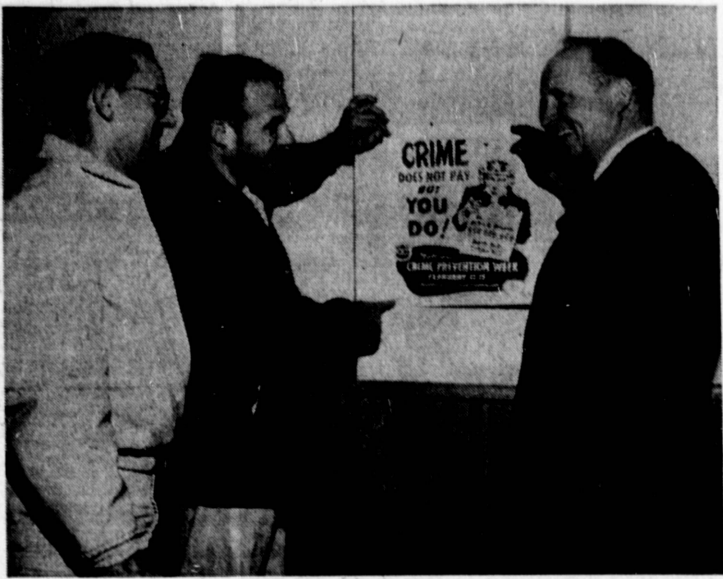

them by the Registrar of Voters after the 1960 General Election cancellation need not register.)

- Those who have become of age and have not registered.
- New residents of Los Angeles County who will have the required qualifications by the date of election.

THESE qualifications include:

- One year residence in the state;
- Ninety days residence in the county;
- Twenty-one years of age.
- An naturalized citizen must have been a citizen for at least 90 days prior to the date of the election and must show his naturalization papers to the deputy when registering for the first time.
- All voters must be able to read the English language and sign their names, and must not be disqualified to vote by reason of a felony conviction.

Information on location of deputy registrars in the various areas can be obtained from the city clerk's office at the city hall.

the college, he appeared in Murdock Stadium and spoke to a capacity crowd.

Dr. Marsee greeted the senator and recalled his visit.

"GOLDWATER was brought on campus by the Young Republicans and persons from all over Southern California came to hear him speak. The stadium was completely filled and Goldwater gave a stirring

speech although the occasion was hurried," Dr. Marsee said.

Through a "gesture of friendship," Charles Laughton appeared in the Campus Theater to present one of his well-known readings.

"Laughton's ability to charm his audience is overwhelming," the college president recalled. "Although he had no rehearsal, Laughton gave a most dramatic performance. He stands out in my mind, as one of the world's finest performers."

From the scientific field the college professor presented Dr. Edward Teller of the University of California's science department.

"This person impressed me most by his knowledge of the scientific studies and his ability to speak for an hour without notes," Dr. Marsee said.

"Dr. Teller did not talk about warfare and still his speech was interesting and vital," he continued. "His discussion of education and educators was very sound and scholarly."

AMONG THE other prominent persons who have visited the campus recently are Lord Clement Attlee, former British prime minister; Herbert Philbrick, FBI counter-spy; Vincent Price, actor, and Dr. Samuel B. Gould, chancellor of the University of California at Santa Barbara.

"The college is looking forward to presenting more of these famed people, through both the student body funds and as guests of the college," Dr. Marsee stressed.

DURING THE coming semester the college will present Ogen Nash, speaking on the "Portable Ogen Nash," and Margaret Mead, who will speak on the "Position of Man in the 20th Century America."

Other notables who visit the El Camino College campus from time to time include foreign educational leaders who have learned of the college's outstanding achievements and facilities from national, state, and educational authorities. Ex-Navy Men Get Chance To Go Back

Ex-Navy men over 31 years of age are now eligible for re-enlistment, it has been announced by Chief H. J. Piech, local Navy recruiter.

Maximum age for entry into the regular Navy remains at 31, he added; however, previous years of active Navy duty may be deducted from a man's age for computing maximum age requirements.

Men desiring to re-enlist for another hitch may do so for a two-, three-, or four-year obligation. They will be eligible for 30 days' advance leave immediately after re-enlistment, Chief Piech said.
