**Guest From Netherland's Shares Favorite Recipes**

Mrs. Siets Boonstra of Wierdum Friesland, The Netherlands, who is here visiting her relatives, Mr. and Mrs. Peter Boonstra, 3833 Spencer St., took time out from her visiting with relatives and old friends, from her native country, and seeing the sights in California to contribute some of her choice recipes to the HERALD'S Favorite Recipe column.

Mrs. Boonstra retired in December from a six-year term as president of the De Plattelands vrouw Woman's Club of Wierdum. The six-year term for all officers is customary in the Netherlands. The retiring president was given a past president's pin designed in the shape of an ear of barley.

The visitor has not only been active in the women's organizations in her native country but has spent much of her time assisting her fellowman. During the Zeeland flood in February 1953, Mrs. Boonstra and her late husband worked with the relief corps and American soldiers in assisting flood victims. During the past summer, she spent 10 days working as a social worker in a rest home for the elderly and convalescents at Lage Vuursche in Provincie, Utrecht.

For today's recipe column she has chosen three recipes, a pudding, a fruit concoction, and a vegetable, popular in her native country.

**Zeewse Pudding**

- 1 pint milk (heated)
- 1 egg (beaten)
- 2 tablespoons corn starch
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- ¼ teaspoon salt

Combine all ingredients with 1/3 cup cold milk. Then add heated milk and cook until it thickens. Remove from heat and add 6 to 8 crushed almond cookies or coconut macaroons and 1 to 2 tablespoons of maple syrup. Chill in oiled mold. Decorate with fruit or whipped cream.

**Fruit Soup**

- ½ cup pearl barley
- 3 pints water
- 1 cup mixed fruit
- 1 lemon rind
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 apple
- 2 oranges
- 1 banana

Simmer barley in three pints of water for one hour. Add 1 cup mixed dried fruit (such as apricots, prunes, peaches, or pears), 1 lemon rind, ½ cup sugar, simmer ½ hour or more. Remove from heat, add juice from two oranges, 1 chopped apple and 1 sliced banana.

**Stewed Leek**

Clean and trim two bunches of leek. Cut into one-inch slices, cook in small amount of water until tender. Drain, reserving juice for sauce.

Sauce: Mix 1 cup juice and ¼ cup vinegar. Combine 2 tablespoons flour, 2 tablespoons butter, salt, pepper to taste. Combine with vinegar juice, cook until thickened, then pour over leek in serving dish. Sprinkle with nutmeg.
