Sauce: Mix 1 cup juice and ¼ cup vinegar. Combine 2 tablespoons flour, 2 tablespoons butter, salt, pepper to taste. Combine with vinegar juice, cook until thickened, then pour over leek in serving dish. Sprinkle with nutmeg.
