

Students Named for Symposium on Space

Selection of high school student-teacher teams to participate in the First International Women's Space Symposium at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles Feb. 22 has been announced by Shirley Thomas, aerospace author and symposium chairman.

School will be student Pamela Schummer, teacher Paul Hawkins, and administrator Dr. W. Bruce Wagner Jr.

Representing South High School will be student Ann Coulter, teacher Miss Carmelita Rous, and administrator Lysle Albro.

Representing Torrance High School will be student Melinda Capps and teacher John S. Knapp.

They will join other students and educators from 125 Southern California senior high schools in the all-day sessions to be addressed by national space officials, women scientists, educators, pilots, and aerospace industry leaders.

The symposium will spearhead a nationwide movement to encourage high school girls to enter scientific careers in the space age. Speakers will include Maxwell W. Hunter, aerospace consultant to the National Aeronautics and Space Council; A. Scott Crossfield, X-15 test pilot; Jerrie Cobb, woman astronaut trainee; and Capt. R. C. Truax, USN (Ret.), past national president of the American Rocket Society.

Airman Basic Frank E. Hurst, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eldon L. Jones of 2306 W. 235th St., is being assigned to the United States Air Force technical training course for radio and radar maintenance specialists at Keesler AFB, Miss.

Airman Hurst, who has completed his basic military training, was selected for the advanced course on the basis of his interests and aptitudes.

Heart Sunday Drive Scheduled in City

"Heart Fund dollars are used to fight the heart and blood vessel diseases, which are the nation's number one health enemy," Mrs. Frieda M. Shaffer, 2052 Santa Fe Ave., declared yesterday.

"Feb. 15, Heart Sunday volunteers will be calling on their neighbors to ask for contributions to the Heart Fund," she said. "We know the residents of Torrance, because of their growing concern over heart disease and the toll it takes each year, will give and give generously."

THE CHAIRMAN emphasized the many ways the community benefits through the community service and public education programs of the Heart Assn. "For instance," she said, "the Homemakers' Service, an agency that sends out trained nurses to care for families where the mother might be ill, or not at home, or to care for the sick or aged — in some cases, heart patients, receives partial support from the Heart Assn."

"WHETHER THE Torrance Heart Fund meets its goal for 1962 or falls short will be determined by Heart Sunday contributions," said community chairman, Mrs. Shaffer. "We earnestly hope that all residents who are away when a volunteer calls will place a generous contribution in the envelope left at the door and mail it promptly to Heart Fund headquarters," she urged. Heart volunteers in Torrance will be calling on their friends and neighbors Feb. 15 through 18. Volunteers will carry proper identification and will show it upon request.

Employers of Southwest Given Word on Wage Law

Southwest employers were urged this week by a representative of the United States Department of Labor to apply with caution exemptions contained in the complex Fair Labor Standards Act, generally known as the Federal Wage and Hour Law.

On hand from San Francisco to speak at a Shop Talk covering recent Wage and Hour Law changes presented by the Merchants and Manufacturers Assn., at the Plush Horse Inn, was Frank J. Muench, regional director, Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions.

He pointed out "these standards are mandatory" and the Department has "no administrative discretion" with respect to enforcing the law.

MUENCH ADVISED the employers to get authoritative guidance to avoid costly hazards, saying "this is available to you through your association."

Expressing the Department's appreciation for the M & M Assn. series to be held at six Metropolitan locations to appraise Southern California business and industry of recent Wage and Hour Law changes, Muench said:

"We are grateful to the officers of the Association for providing us with this opportunity to discuss with you the requirements of this basic economic law which prescribes minimum wage, overtime pay and child labor standards for millions of workers throughout the nation."
