Employers of Southwest Given Word on Wage Law

Southwest employers were urged this week by a representative of the United States Department of Labor to apply with caution exemptions contained in the complex Fair Labor Standards Act,generally known as the Federal Wage and Hour Law.

On hand from San Francisco to speak at a Shop Talk covering recent Wage and Hour Law changes presented by the Merchants and Manufacturers Assn., at the Plush Horse Inn, was Frank J. Muench, regional director, Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions.

He pointed out "these standards are mandatory" and the Department has "no administration, discration," with results are and hour staff specialist.

Department has "no administration discretion" with respect to enforcing the law.

MUENCH ADVISED the employers to get authoritative guidance to avoid costly hazards, saying "this is available to you through your association."
