

Howell have been selected to design the blueprints for the project which will complete the fourth phase multimillion dollar con-struction program, which will make Harbor College one of the most modern junior col-leges in the state. leges in the state.

The firm will have 30 days to bring preliminary drawings up to date and then will have 200 days for completion of working drawings and specifications

Fourth phase includes class-room buildings for the social room buildings for the social sciences, art, engineering and technical, and music depart-ments a drama building, ex-tensive site grading, 4,000 ad-ditional bleachers for the col-lege's athletic field, athletic courts, and alterations to the cafeteria and graphic arts building

cafeteria and graphic arts building. Total cost of the new build-ings is estimated at \$2,538,000 and alterations and improve-ments are expected to cost ap-proximately \$162,000. Funds for the \$2,700,000 fourth phase will be sought in the 1962 school bond program, which is scheduled to be on the June 5 ballot, the superin-endent said.
