

Rivierans to Observe Founding of Rotary Club

The 57th anniversary of Rotary International, worldwide service organization of business and professional men, will be observed Thursday, Feb. 22, by members of the Hollywood Riviera Rotary Club when it meets for its regular luncheon at the Plush Horse. The Riviera Rotarians will join a worldwide celebration planned by more than 11,000 Rotary clubs and half a million Rotarians in 124 countries and geographical regions. In ob-

serving the occasion, the past presidents of the Riviera club will speak briefly on Rotary and its past achievements. PAST PRESIDENTS include Dr. Robert Nielsen, C. Smith, Dr. Richard Sansom, Troy Berryman, R. Allen, and John Burch. President Jack Whiting, recalling the early days of the club, said, "When Rotary began in 1905, its appeal to businessmen was largely social. Today,

friendship is still basic in Rotary, but only for its ability to provide service-minded men with increased opportunities to serve." WORLD understanding is furthered by Rotary through personal contacts at international gatherings and through intercountry exchanges of correspondence, programs, publications, and of students who cross boundary lines to live and study in another nation.

The Rotary International convention will be held in Los Angeles in June. Carl P. Miller, executive director of the Pacific coast edition of the Wall Street Journal and owner of the neighboring Palos Verdes News, has been nominated for president of the organization. He is scheduled to be installed as president-elect at the Los Angeles convention. It will mark the first time in the history of the service club that a Southern Californian has
