David K. Lyman, candidate for Torrance City Council in the election to be held April 10, 1962, announced that his wife, Marion Lyman, would manage his campaign.

Mrs. Lyman was born in England and has lived in Egypt and Trinidad before coming to the United States in 1954. She became an American citizen in 1959 and voted for the first time in this country in the presidential election of 1960. She married Mr. Lyman in 1955 and is the mother of two young daughters.

"I find American politics exciting, stimulating, and well worth the effort of participation," Mrs. Lyman said. "While it sounds impressive to carry the title of campaign manager, I have found from past experience that the job is a combination of telephone operator, secretary, bookkeeper, social secretary, coffee server, and morale booster," she continued.

When asked how she stood up under the barrage of charges and countercharges that are a part of American political campaigns, she stated that, "At first I was rather startled but my experience of living through the battle of Britain and surviving the bombings of World War II in England have been good training for American politics. 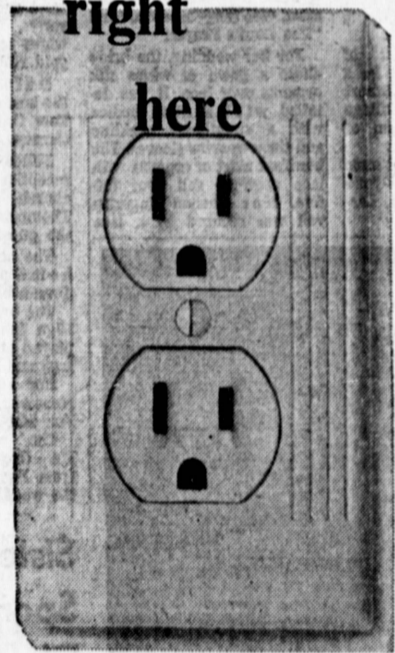
