Opportunities in Varied Careers to Be Explained

Career opportunities in engineering will be explained to Harbor area high school students and their parents at a special two-part program scheduled Saturday at 10 a.m. in Harbor College, 1111 Figueroa Place, Wilmington.

Prominent engineers will discuss the various branches of engineering at the meeting which is sponsored by the Senior High School Principals Assn. and the Los Angeles Council of Engineering Societies.

Speakers will cover civil, mechanical, aeronautical, mining and metallurgical, petroleum, electrical, and chemical engineering. A panel directed toward women in engineering also will be offered.

are further extended, additional areas of work for engineers will be provided. Therefore, there is every indication that the demand for engineers will go on increasing rapidly.

"Engineering has been one of the fastest growing professional occupations in the United States in the past 50 years. And yet, a shortage of engineers exists. Due to this shortage, industry competes for the services of college graduates on a scale seldom matched in any field of endeavor.

FIRST PART of the program will be a general meeting in the auditorium for all students and parents at which a keynote speaker will address the group. Panel discussions on specific fields will be presented during the second portion of the meeting. At this time representatives will discuss career opportunities in specialized areas, including requirements for entrance into the field, opportunities for advancement, working conditions, training facilities, and training required.

"ACCREDITED engineering colleges are literally swamped with offers for their graduate engineers. Junior college graduates from sub-professional engineering courses are also in high demand."

Jan W. Plum, city schools' senior high school counseling supervisor, said, "The work of engineers and scientists is the basis of our industrial expansion."

All parents and students who are interested in learning about career opportunities in engineering are invited by officials to attend this meeting.

The second portion of the program will be divided into two sub-sections, allowing students to obtain detailed information in two specialized fields.
