The American public had reason to be proud recently - proud of a new First Lady who has revitalized an old house. Mrs. Kennedy's tour of the White House was a splendidly patriotic hour and I cannot recall when I have been so proud of anyone on television - man or woman.

The program gave most citizens a first glampse of our most famous building. It also give Americans their first real look at their First Ltdy. I hadn't realized how little we really know about Mrs. Kennedy until this program. Few have heard her speak in public. Maybe she had been practicing for the tour.

She had done her homework well because her commentary was full of facts, names, dates, and anecdotes and she ad libbed them all without faltering.

The First Lady was not at all what I had expected. Her voice was breathy and precise, almost girlish - a combination of Marilyn Monroe and Shirley Temple. She was beautifully mannered and assured yet shy; and she had a manner of walking that was as unassum ing and dignified as her simple, two-piece wool dress (plum colored, ladies, with a three-strand necklace of pearls).

The history of the old house is fascinating and Mrs. Kennedy knew it in every detail. It is a storehouse of American history and it is astonishing that, until now, there had been no real interest in the place shown by any First Lady of recent administration.

Until a law was passed last year, at the behest of the Kennedy Administration, any President (or more likely his wife) could sell or give away anything in the building! Mrs. Lincoln was the worst offender and sold off a great many pieces of furniture which are slowly being returned by the descendants of the people who bought them. Mrs. Kennedy remembered the names of the people who have donated things - and happily and lovingly noted their gifts.

In the Blue Room a marble bust of Washington was placed above a handsome pier table of Monroe's period. "I found the bust in the men's room downstairs and the table was being used for a sawhorse in the workshop," said Mrs. Kennedy brightly.

Mrs. Eisenhower acquired the 18th Century furniture in the Diplomatic Reception Room and Mrs. Coolidge had shown some interest in the building, but the names of Bess Truman and Eleanor Roosevelt were totally absent from the conversation.

People seldom associate Theodore Roosevelt with such things," said Mrs. Kennedy, "but he was second only to Thomas Jefferson in his interest in the architecture and furnishings of the White House." (Among other things, Roosevelt added some stuffed heads of animals he had shot. Mrs. Kennedy did not disclose their present whereabouts. Maybe she used them to replace the bust of George Washington.)
