I wither to think of the collective shudder that must go through the actuarial departments of the great national life insurance companies when another of the kinetic Kennedys pronounces himself, or herself, in favor of the vigorous life for all.

The actuaries, unlike football coaches and suchlike worthy biceps nuts, have a vested interest in keeping people alive. They lose money when people

The idea has gotten through to the insurance people, as it has to a good many sensible doctors, that when Bobby tags Peter at touch football, or Teddy beats back mountainous waves with Jean, or Eunice and Sarge race a couple of miles along the beach - well, maybe more harm than good is being

This reverence for exercise is one of our national lunacies. It wins votes and kills people especially people over 40.

The Kennedys will doubtless keep pressing the virtues of the impossibly strenuous life, even knowing the President's back injury dates originally from a football accident.

That's the kind of people they are. And the man who made them this way is the clan patriarch, Joe Kennedy, who recently collapsed on a golf course. After presenting the hard face of vigorous manhood at age 73.

I believe exercise is necessary only when it is unavoidable. That is, when you are a kid. Then, NOTHING can stop you from wild exertions, if you are normal. Nor could any exhortation cause you to take them up. It's just natural, a part of growing.

A man after my own heart is Dr. Peter J. Steincrohn, a Connecticut physician of standing who has waged a crusade against "American addiction to the cult of the strenuous." Some of his apothegms:

"Exercise all you want up to 30; slow up at 35; don't lift a finger unnecessarily after 40."

"Calisthenics is an affliction. The word sounds like a disease, and it is. I have yet to observe a joyful countenance atop the spinal column that is twisting, turning, and bending."

"Don't run if you can walk. Do not over-exercise unless someone points a gun at you . . . Exercise is outdated — like mustache cups, blacksmiths or barber-surgeons.

"We can dismiss all exercise with a wave of the hand. The only exceptions to this all-inclusive gesture are daily walks and the purposeful bodily movements associated with hobbies, such as gardening and others."

The doc is no fanatic. He has played baseball and college football, boxed and played tennis and ridden horses. Yet he notes that a survey showed the interesting fact that Phi Beta Kappas live longer than most students. Another survey revealed that one third of all gym students at a large university were con-


"You need all the energy you have," he says, "to prepare you for the rigors of 'just living' in the manner most of us do in the 20th Century. Don't waste it. Hoard it. Be lazy (to a degree)."
