In choosing her recipes for today's column Mrs. Midthun, who is busy with church and PTA activities, selected four for which she has had the most requests. They are as follows:

Swedish Rye Bread

Mix into a paste and let stand: 1 cup warm water 1½ cups white flour packages dry yeast

teaspoon sugar Mix separately and scald: cups milk and 1 cup water

tablespoons shortening

cup brown sugar cup white sugar cup molasses cups rye flour

cup white flour 1 teaspoon anise seed 1½ teaspoon caraway seed 3 tablespoons dark Karo syrup

Mix well and add yeast mixture. Add 2 cups white flour. Put 31/2 cups white flour on board. Dump rye mixture and fold in and knead until flour is used up. Place in large greased pan and let rise until double in bulk. Make into four loaves. Let rise until double. Bake at 350 degress for one hour.

Pineapple Dessert

lb. vanilla wafers 1½ cups powdered sugar 3 eggs

pint whipping cream No. 2 can Pineapple (crushed and drained)

Crush wafers fine and put half in bottom of loaf cake pan. Cream butter and sugar thoroughly. Add well beaten eggs. Spread mixture over layer of crushed wafers in tin. Whip cream and add well drained pineapple. Spread over other layers and lastly spread remaining crumbs. Let stand 36 hours in refrigerator. May be topped with whipped cream or marischino cherries.

Pudding Coffee Cake

Mix 1 cup flour, 1/4 lb. butter or oleo and 1 tablespoon water, like a pie crust. Pat onto a cookie sheet making 2 strips 4 or 5 inches wide.

Then mix 1 cup water, 1/4 cup butter and 1/2 cup sugar. Heat to a boiling point. Add 1 cup flour as it comes from the stove. Add

three eggs, slightly beaten, spooning it in about 1 tablespoon at a time. Add 1/2 teaspoon almond extract. Pour this over the crust which has been patted out. It will be thick. Bake 45 minutes or until brown in 350 degree oven.

Topping: 1 cup powdered sugar, 1 tablespoon butter, and 1 teaspoon almond extract. Add enough cream to this for spreading. Serve immediately. Enough for 10 persons.

Boneless Birds

One pound round steak or use round steak sliced about ¼ inch thick. Cut into 3x5 pieces. Place a piece of bacon or a thin slice of side pork on each. Season with salt and a pinch of ginger. Add a little chopped onion. Roll. Hold together with toothpicks. Flour and brown in hot fat. Let simmer on very low flame for about 11/2 hours. Make gravy from drippings.
