Food Giant Completes Warehouse

In a move designed to streamline handling procedures and operations, Food Giant Markets have consolidated their formerly widespread facilities into a newly constructed five unit complex on a 25-acre site at 12500 E. Slauson Ave., Santa Fe Springs. It was announced by Theodore E. Cummings, president of the rapidly growing supermarket chain.

"We believe," said Cummings, in making the announcement, "that this new warehouse complex will make Food Giant one of the most efficient and cost-saving market chains in the entire country." Total estimated construction cost of the project, exclusive of furnishings, equipment and inventories is expected to exceed \$1,750,000, Cummings said.

The 1,089,000 square foot area now houses the dry grocery warehouse, delicatessen and produce warehouse, sign and carpentry shops, and auto maintenance depot. The dry grocery warehouse also houses the non-foods and liquor departments.

A new administration and executive offices building, still under construction, will also be contained in the complex. To be occupied sometime in April, the new administration building will house the more than 250 people now spread over three buildings. All other buildings in the complex are now in use, Cummings said.
