Fred Spangler, candidate for the post of city treasurer, stated that this post should never be treated as a "rubber stamp" job, but rather, as an important public office.

Its holder should be the voice, the conscience of the citizens of Torrance and should alert them when their interests in city hall are being challenged. The treasurer should attend the meetings of Torrance homeowner groups.

Homeowners are vitally concerned about the large assess-

ments, their mortgages, and want their tax money to be spent in the most economical way, he said.

Another challenge must be met by the next treasurer, a more active management of the city's investment program, or, the reinvestment of temporarily idle funds. From time to time the city has large amounts of money in the bank account because the revenue comes in big chunks but is spent gradually and in smaller amounts. This creates idle cash which could be wisely invested

in time deposits, absolutely safe short term federal or state securities or treasury bonds which would mature at the time the money was needed.

Lists of such securities, at an average yield of 3½ per cent, are constantly issued by the banks and must be studied. For example, the amount of \$100,000 invested for three months can produce \$1,000 in interest.

It is the responsibility of the treasurer to be aware of these possibilities, to familiarize

himself with the money market, because this will create extra revenue for the city that does not come out of the taxpayer's pocket and can provide a measure of tax relief for property owners, he said.

Mrs. Robert Kerber gave a coffee klatch for friends and neighbors on behalf of City Council Candidate Ken Miller this week. Miller, a member of the Torrance Planning Commission, said he is campaigning on the basis of giving the "independent, responsible leadership" the people of Torrance have indicated they are seeking.
