

Robert Plomert Jr., Civic Leader, Dies

Funeral services for Robert I. Plomert Jr., twice president of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce and active in many Torrance civic and industrial organizations, will be held at 2 p.m. Friday in Grace Chapel, Inglewood Park Cemetery, with the Rev. Randall C. Phillips and members of Alexander Hamilton Masonic Lodge No. 535 officiating.

Mr. Plomert, en route to Seattle on a business trip, was found dead Monday in a San Francisco hotel room apparently the victim of a heart attack.

HE ALSO was a member of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, the Tax Executives Institute, Inc., a charter member and past president of the Los Angeles Chapter of American Right of Way Assn., and was formerly chairman of the Western Oil and Gas Assn.

He is survived by his widow, Ellen; his father, Robert I. Plomert Sr.; his mother, Mrs. Sarah Durkin; and a sister, Mrs. Patty Johnstone.

Hall and Malloy Mortuary of Los Angeles is in charge of funeral arrangements.

Police Nab Three Young Sign Vandals

Police Sunday night took into custody three teenagers they discovered taking down political campaign posters.

They were Douglas C. Abbott, 18, of 3814 W. 185th St.; Dale E. White, 18, of 3412 W. 186th St., and a 15-year-old who was released to juvenile authorities.

Police said the three admitted destroying more than 50 campaign posters. They were arrested about 2 a.m. at Carson Street and Hawthorne Avenue after police observed Abbott carrying a campaign poster and running through a field towards a sedan occupied by the other two youths.

TWO SIGNS were found in the back seat of the car. Abbott told police that "he was tired of seeing all the corners cluttered with signs and that people had to pay for their advertisements." Police said Abbott added, he "just couldn't stand to see these people putting up their sign and not having to pay for it."

White told police he tore down four signs at 182nd Street and Yukon Avenue, six

at 174th Street and Arlington Avenue. At Carson Street and Hawthorne he and the other two youths tore down and damaged signs on all three corners, White said.

Dr. Hull remarked during the controversy that "no matter who is elected, we have to get along with him."

Dr. Rafferty, superintendent of La Canada Schools, is a conservative candidate for the state office.

IN OTHER action, board member Bert Lynn proposed tax revolution to return the control of schools to the local level.

Lynn called his campaign "Local Aid to Education" or L.A.T.E. and said it would give school districts twice as much financial help as federal aid.

Lynn's proposal is that the public demand a change in federal income tax laws to permit taxes paid to local school districts to be deducted from the taxpayers' bill to the government.

"For example," Lynn said, "let's assume we have 50,000 taxpayers in Torrance, each of whom pays \$200 in federal income tax.

"If each of these paid \$50 to the Torrance schools and sent \$150 to Washington with a receipt for the \$50 locally, the Torrance schools would receive \$2.5 million. As it is now, to get \$2.5 million back from Washington, we would have to send \$5 million."

LYNN EXPLAINED the difference in the money received, saying "to get one dollar back from Washington, you have to send two. If you just mail them a check and they mail it right back, it costs 24 cents."

Although he did not ask Torrance board members to take immediate action, Lynn hoped the staff would work with vigor to draw up a resolution which could be sent broadside to groups across the country for endorsement.

"It is a beautiful dream, but the people in power are dreaming on the other side," Dr. Kurt Sherry said.

"Let's see who is bigger," Lynn replied.
