Ten North High School students were among 300 students from the Los Angeles area who attended the Junior Math Seminar Thursday at the California Museum of Science and Industry. The museum sponsored the seminar in order to enable the students and teachers of the Los Angeles schools to hear outstanding mathematicians and the latest developments on the frontiers of mathematics.

Speakers for the seminar were Dr. Thomas Apostel, professor of mathematics at the California Institute of Technology, and Dr. Basil Gordon, professor of mathematics at the University of California at Los Angeles.

The students also visited an exhibit called "Mathematics, a World of Numbers and Beyond."
