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Judge Dunbar In Superior Court Race

Municipal Court Judge Donald E. Dunbar, has opened his campaign to succeed retiring Judge Fletcher Bowron in Office number 47 of the Los Angeles Superior Court.

In his more than eight years experience on the Municipal Court, Judge Dunbar has served over two years on the Superior Court bench by assignment of the Judicial Council.

Judge Dunbar believes "an independent judiciary is vital. A judge must have ability, experience and devotion to duty. He must be capable and willing to carry his full share of the case load," he said.

An honor student at the University of California, Judge Dunbar graduated in 1938. He then attended the University of Southern California Law School, graduating in 1942, when he was admitted to the California State Bar.

A native of Los Angeles County, Judge Dunbar, 45, has resided in Compton since 1947. He and his wife, the former Rosemary Moore, who is also an attorney, are the parents of 5 children, ranging in age from 6 to 13 years.

Miller Calls for End To City Council Schism

"A divided City Council cannot and has not fully represented the people of Torrance," City Council Candidate Ken Miller declared this week. Miller appealed to the citizens of the community to not only vote next Tuesday but to vote for a unity of purpose in their city's highest position of trust and authority.
