It was, in a sense, my refusal to accept the fact that I was not "like everyone else." Now I know that epilepsy is 10 times more common than polio. I know, too, that epi-lepsy has nothing to do with insanity, intelligence or being possessed by the devil. It is not inherited. It is not con-tagious. It is not fatal. And is rarely handicapping. I am now 41, married to a e man and we have three children. I've been driving a car for five years and my ill-ness does not limit me in any ay. Medication has made a

ormal life possible. I hope the father of this irl will contact the local epilepsy agency.
