

Senator Engle Seeks End To Immigration Ratios

Senator Clair Engle (D-Calif.) is co-sponsor of new federal legislation designed to remove provisions in the Immigration and Nationality Act that discriminate against certain races and countries.

"The bill is not an open invitation to foreign lands to flood us with immigrants," Senator Engle said. "In short, it brings our immigration policies into focus with reality."

"Through short-term and special acts of Congress, we are now admitting more people outside the quota provisions of the 1952 legislation than we do through the Act itself. Of a total immigration of 2.5 million in the 1950s, three out of five persons were admitted outside the existing quota provisions."

SENATOR ENGLE added: "America's role of leadership in the free world is one of great sensitivity and our position is not enhanced by an immigration policy which implies that some nationalities and some races are less desirable members of the family of man than are others."

The Senator said the bill would authorize 250,000 quota visas annually, 50,000 of which would be available to refugees without regard to quota areas. The rest, he said, would be allocated to nations on the basis of populations and previous immigration ratios.

UNUSED QUOTA numbers would be pooled at the end of the year and divided among areas having a backlog of applicants. Special provision would be made for admitting blood relatives and quotas would be revised every five years.

Senator Engle said: "Until those provisions of our immigration laws which discriminate against racial and national groups are eliminated, our laws needlessly provide grist for the propaganda mills of Moscow and Peiping."

Guaranty Bank to Open Doors at 10 a.m. Today

Torrance's new, independent Guaranty Bank will formally open today in its interim quarters on Hawthorne Blvd., just south of the Del Amo Center.

A month-long celebration is planned, with a drawing for valuable prizes. Winners will be announced on May 23. To celebrate the opening, the bank is mailing special announcements containing lucky numbers to residents of the area.

VISITORS to the bank during the opening month may register their numbers and be eligible for prizes which include a color TV set, hi-fi set, and hundreds of dollars worth of free Guaranty Bank savings accounts. The bank is welcoming all registrants of lucky numbers with a free gift of a specially designed pocket secretary.

Henry C. Griswold, well-known land developer and long-time resident of the district, is chairman of the bank's board of directors. The bank will be "locally managed and established to serve local residents," according to Griswold, who referred to the need for a local independent bank in the area.

Guaranty Bank is the only independent bank in Torrance, fulfilling a need that has not been met since Torrance National was merged eight years ago with what is now United California Bank.
