

Walter J. Teague, vice president of Pepperdine College, will be keynote speaker Sunday at dedication ceremonies for the new Torrance Church of Christ, 3320 Emerald St. The public program will start at 2:30 p.m. An open house and reception is scheduled after the dedication service. Teague will talk on "Dedication," emphasizing the dedication of each individual Christian as well as dedication of the use of the building.

TEAGUE, an Abilene Christian College graduate, has done advanced work at Columbia University. He is married and has three children. Robert Donelson, choral director of Pepperdine College, will be guest song director and will direct congregational singing. Donelson received the masters degree in music performance at San Jose State College and worked for two years in the San Francisco Opera Workshop.

He serves as assistant minister and song director of the Vermont Avenue Church of Christ. Donelson recently directed a 1000-voice chorus that was accorded a standing ovation by an audience of 10,000 persons at the Los Angeles Sports Arena. The event was the final meeting of the Pepperdine College Bible Lecture-ship. The chorus was composed of singers from 30 congregations including singers from Redondo Beach and Torrance.

HIGHLIGHT of the reception will be the introduction of Elmer Prout and his family. Prout is returning from Japan where he served for more than three years as a missionary. He will resume his work as minister for the local church. The open house will be highlighted by introduction of Sunday school teachers who teach classes from pre-school through college ages as well as four adult classes.
