Acts by Gardena and Torrance teenagers highlighted the annual "Talent Time" program sponsored by the Harbor Bay and West Bay High School Red Cross councils and presented Tuesday night for patients at the Veterans hospital in Westwood.

## Red Cross in Push To Finish Campaign

Red Cross volunteers, under the direction of Ken Miller, Torrance fund campaign chairman, are putting forth extra effort to wind up the drive in this area.

"We've got a lot of work to do before we adequately meet our share of the support needed if Red Cross is to continue to serve this community," Miller said in announcing that only 50 per cent of Torrance's \$11,400 goal has been made.

ALTHOUGH presently trailing the other areas included in the Southern Region of the Los Angeles American Red Cross Chapter, Torrance fund leaders feel their final results for the 1962 drive will improve.

Miller says many workers have yet to complete their assignments and turn in their kits. Additional contacts must be made to clean up the campaigning among past givers classified as special prospects in the residential and business phases of the drive.

With additional money expected, business drive leaders, Robert Lewellen and Mary and Jackie Pagac report 73 per cent of their goal is in.

THE house-to-house solicitation, under the direction of Mrs. Alpha Larrieux, South Torrance, has netted 53 per cent of its goal. Remittance envelopes were left at all homes where no answer was made to doorbell ringing by neighborhood volunteers.

Those persons who have not been personally contacted for their contributions are asked to mail their checks to Red Cross or they may call the regional Red Cross office, SP 5-1404 and a volunteer will be sent to pick it up.

Remittances not yet in from firms and their employees included in the commerce and industry phase of the campaign are expected to bring up the area's overall standing considerably.

C&I chairman, Clarence Clark, says to date only 38 per cent of the goal has been made.

## Disneyland 'Spring Fling' Launches Vacation Season

"Spring Fling," a special party in Disneyland Saturday night, set off a full week of spring vacation events climaxed by the Seventh Annual Old Fashioned Easter Parade on Easter Sunday, and—with high hopes, weather permitting and lots of luck—a real balloon flight from the Park's Plaza Hub.

For the spring vacation period, Disneyland will be open seven days a week starting today through April 29. Hours are 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. April 15-April 22; and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. April 23-April 29. The park will again be closed on Mondays and Tuesdays starting April 30.

ON EASTER SUNDAY, Disneyland will hold its Seventh Annual Easter Parade classic. Thirty horseless carriages and other antique vehicles, with more than 200 riders and strollers will parade down Main Street, U.S.A., dressed in costumes of the early American period. Fifteen cars from the Horseless Carriage Club of Southern California will be on display inside the Disneyland main gate from 9 a.m. Easter Sunday to 5 p.m.

Immediately following the Easter Parade, the Plaza Hub will go back to an era beyond even that of turn-of-the-century Main Street. The era of balloons and man's initial adventure into space. In fitting costume and his fingers crossed, a real balloonist will lift himself in a basket and rise in free flight in the same balloon that appeared in the film "Around the World in 80 Days." Disneyland comment on this final Easter event: "We hope."
