"Hit It" is an expression with its own meaning for the Claude Creasey family at 3203 Newton St., Torrance.

It means, in family vernacular, that all have skis and will travel, or during the season, that the entire family will be in the grandstand at the Little League game cheering for the home team.

Claude and Elizabeth (Liz) Creasey met at Narbonne High from which they were both graduated. She attended Los Angeles City College and Claude studied at Harbor Junior College, where presently he is taking a Fire Science course. He is a Los Angeles City fireman.

As today's guest in the Favorite Recipe Column, Mrs. Creasey has chosen three recipes, that are tops with her family, to share with HERALD readers.

Southern Fried Chicken

Clean chicken and cut in serving pieces. Place flour seasoned with salt and pepper in a clean paper bag and dust the chicken parts. Melt a cup of shortening (skillet should be almost half full) over a medium flame, cook the chicken until brown on one side. Turn chicken, cover with lid and simmer over flame as low as it will go until meat is very tender (about one hour). Remove lid and slowly brown pieces on both sides until crisp. A secret to remember for good chicken is to use smaller chickens and to simmer it thoroughly before the final browning.

Millionaire Salad

3 eggs 1 8-oz. can white grapes, drained  
4 tablespoons sugar 1 8-oz. jar maraschino cherries, drained, sliced  
3 tablespoons lemon juice 1 cup miniature marshmallows  
1 tablespoon butter 2 sliced bananas (optional)  
1/2 pint whipped cream 1/4 cup nut meats (optional)  
1 can #2 pineapple tidbits, drained

Break eggs into top of double boiler, beat until thick. Beat in sugar, lemon juice and butter. Place over hot water, beating constantly until thick like a pudding. Cool. Fold in whipped cream, then stir in remaining ingredients. Cover and refrigerate for 24 hours. Serve in lettuce cups and garnish with mayonnaise for a salad or serve in a dessert goblet with whipped cream for an unforgettable dessert.

Sweet Potato Cups

Cut three oranges in halves and remove pulp. Peel 6 medium sweet potatoes boiled in jackets. Mash, moisten with orange juice and small amounts of pulp fine, if desired. Season with butter and salt. Fill orange halves with mixture, topped with a marshmallow and brown in a slow oven (300 degrees).

Variation: Omit pulp and add 1/4 cup chopped nut meats 1 tablespoon brown sugar same seasonings as above and orange juice

This is excellent with ham or pork and while a treat to eat, it is also very colorful on a simple menu. I use it in place of candied yams at times, because it isn't nearly as sweet or heavy with meals. It can be prepared the day before but it takes a while longer to warm through and then brown the marshmallow. They are best taken from the oven a few minutes before serving.
