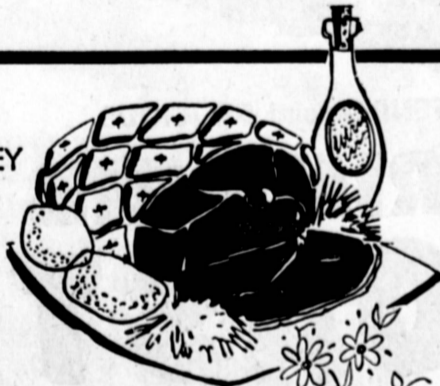

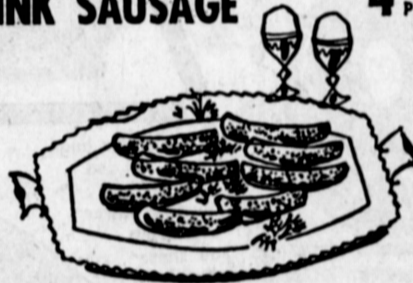

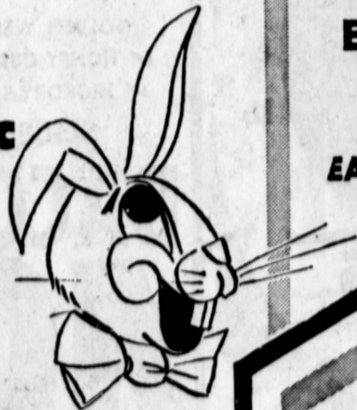

Garden Checklist
