Slim Edwards of the Mel-O-Dee Music center also played several numbers. Dance music was furnished by Larry Carlson and his band.

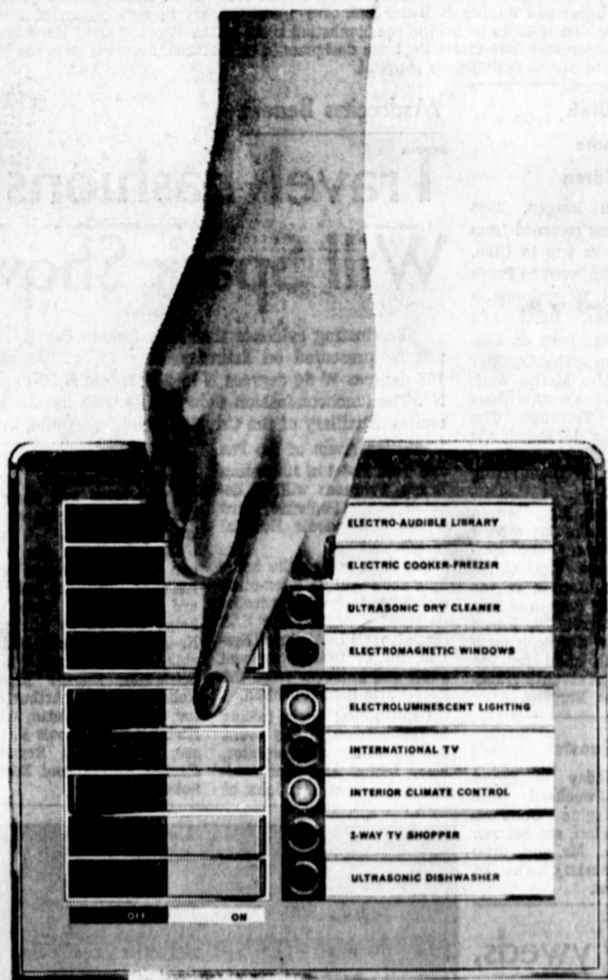
Refreshments were served in the dining room decorated in spring flowers and the Easter motif.
