Surfing Now **Big Business** In Southland

Surfriding, originated so historians tell us by the Hawaiians a thousand years ago, will be the major sports activ-ity of a couple of thousand

with the time major sports activity of a couple of thousand stalwart young males thronging Southern California beaches during Easter vacation.

First introduced to California and the country in 1915 by Duke Kahanamoku who brought along his own Olosurfboard, a hollowed out redwood plank, 16 ft. 2 inches long, 21 inches wide, 4 inches thick and weigh in g 125 pounds, surfinghas become "the" watersport craze among the local undergrad set, and the art of surfboard making is fast developing into big business in a dozen Southland seaside cities. According to 28-year-old Con

According to 28-year-old Con Colburn of Santa Monica, one of a couple dozen experts making surfboards on the West Coast, Yankee ingenuity has been greatly responsible for the present-day surfing

"UP TO 15 years ago," explains Con, "most boards were imported from Hawaii, hand-carved out of solid wood. They were bulky and hard to handle. According to tradition, Hawaiian commoners used 12-foot-long boards weighing 65

pounds.
Royalty used two other types; thick, 16-foot-long boards weighing up to 165 pounds for riding the waves in a prone position, and 60-pound boards made from light, balsa-like wood called Will Will, which could be ridden in a standing losition.

could be ridden in a standing position.

"American surfers started experimenting with balsa wood 10 years ago, and results were excellent. To day, however, most boards are custom made, produced from a form of polyurethene foam, which is even lighter and stronger than balsa. We sand and shape the raw form, cover it with a lightweight fibre material, then paint it with either clear or pigmented resin, the latter to give the board color."
