Preliminary plans and speci-fications for construction of Los Angeles County's pro-posed new \$387,000 Probation Department building in the Torrance civic center complex have been approved by the County Board of Supervisors.

Site for the structure as well as the new Superior Court building and off-street parking were provided cost free to the county by the Torrance City Council.

According to County Super-visor Burton W. Chace, plans for the new courthouse, which will cost upwards of two million dollars, are on the draw-ing board and should be com-pleted by the end of the next fiscal year with construction to begin in the 1963-64 fiscal

term.
The Probation Department building will comprise a one-story structure with a small basement and will house the probation officers and clerical

staff.
