That was the question facing the members and executive board of Las Cancioneros, local mixed choral group, recently.

This question took on major implications in the month of March when it was found that

the usual locales used by the choruses were available for performances only, with little or no rehearsal time. Various members of the group made a survey of empty buildings, auditoriums or large halls in the Torrance area and found that many were already booked, were not large enough, or did not have the facilities for a production.

Finally, one night at a board meeting a member facetiously remarked, "Why don't we get a tent?" and the

idea of a tent show was born. Little did the group know the amount of work involved in such an undertaking—not the least of which was locating a tent.

Then Abbey Rents telephoned Mrs. Reginald B. Roberts, the concert chairman, to say they would like to talk to representatives of the chorus about this problem and the idea of a tent show seemed more feasible.

THE TORRANCE City Council was approached at a meet-

ing for permission to give such a show and the council recommended that the best locale would be in the Torrance Civic Center where there is plenty of parking space in a central location for the Southwest area, and other facilities could be quickly arranged—and so, the tent show became a reality.

"Cancioneros Carousel," to be presented on Friday and Saturday evenings, June 1, 2 and 8, 9 in the green and white striped tent in Torrance Civic Center at 8 p.m., is a

program of vaudeville, melodrama, and music from the latest Broadway shows. With Laird Brooks Schmidt, the world's only one-man group thinker as the featured star, the chorus under director Lyle Heck, will present some lively entertainment.
