he services othered by the Bar Association are twofold in character. First, the Legal Aid Foundation furn is hes legal service to indigent per-sons in need of immediate, emergency assistance; second, the Lawyers Reference Serv-ice refers persons who are ice refers persons who are not indigent but merely want an attorney to be referred to them by the Bar Association.

During 1961 approximately 950 people availed themselves of the services offered and of such number 450 were given assistance in the Legal Aid office and the remaining 500 people were referred to law people were referred to law-yers belonging to the Panel of the Lawyers Reference Service, In 1962 through the end of April, 300 persons availed themselves of these

The costs of furnishing the above services to the citizens of the South Bay Judicial District are defrayed by a small registration fee paid by persons seeking legal assist-ance, and in addition to such income the attorneys of the South Bay have made dona-tions and those who are mem-bers of the Lawyers Refer-ence Panel have paid dues and have given a percentage of any fees they have col-lected to the Legal Aid Foundation. The last report received from the State of California indicated that there was only one other Legal Ald office in the State of California that services and 150 were given was entirely self-supporting was entirely self-supporting without receiving any funds

from the government or from any charitable organization. The South Bay Legal Aid Foundation offers services to the public without any gov-ernment subsidy and without any donation from any charity. The Legal Aid Foundation

The Legal Ald Foundation maintains an office at 421 Pier Ave., Hermosa Beach, which is open on Thursday from 1 to 5 p.m. and on Sat-urday from 10 to 1 p.m. A substantial part of the cost of operating this service is paid for by proceeds from the annual "Counsellors Co-tillion."
