

The moral rehabilitation of Sonny Liston, the pugilist and two-time loser, has gone quite far enough for me, thank you.

Sonny, who wants to yank the heavyweight crown from the heroic brow of Floyd Patterson, was reported the other day as giving serious thought to becoming a Roman Catholic priest. The Hearst chain's Albany, N. Y., newspaper, The

Knickerbocker News, quoted Liston: "I don't know if I got it to be a priest, but I'm thinking about it."

When the story got out, Liston was quick to deny it. "I couldn't become a priest," he said, "I'm a married man."

Sonny's awareness that Catholic priesthood entails a vow of chastity gratified those of his admirers who are aware he just learned to sign his name about a year ago.

Though Sonny quite properly balks at investiture in the clergy, he said he is all for helping the Church to rehabilitate kids by giving boxing exhibitions and talks.

The moral rehabilitation of Sonny Liston is no laughing matter. His upcoming match with Champ Pat-terson is expected to produce a gate estimated at between \$4 million and \$7 million.

So if you read an increasing number of stories wherein the ex-con suddenly sounds like St. Francis Assisi, just render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's. *

* Sonny is not without experience in the rehabilitation bit. It's how he got into boxing, in fact.

Back in 1952, when Sonny was doing 29 months in Missouri State Penitentiary for armed robbery, he was taught boxing. His skill attracted the attention of the Catholic chaplain, Father Alois Stevens, who took on his rehabilitation. Sonny was paroled in custody of the priest.

Sonny turned out such a formidable fighter that it was hard to get fights for him-though he did score six straight wins in a single year, 1955-56.

Father Stevens went a bit sour on Sonny when, in 1956, he assaulted a St. Louis policeman, took the officer's gun away from him, fled the scene and hid the gun at his sister's house.

The case did not come to trial until December, 1956, when Liston was sentenced to nine months in the workhouse. Between arrest and conviction he was arrested four more times-for speeding, failing to answer the summons and twice on suspicion of theft.

> Undaunted by Sonny's previous rehabilitation, another Catholic priest, Father Edward J. Murphy of Denver, took him on about a year ago and taught him to read and write. He also pronounced him officially rehabilitated.

> Who can say? Perhaps this time it's all true, and Sonny is as morally laundered as a newborn babe. All those visions of money dancing before Sonny's eyes are pretty good motivation for him to keep his nose clean until he glaums onto it.

> What is a mite annoying about all this is using the one, holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church as a stalking horse to promote a dubious prize fight.

> Traditionally, prize fight press agents get away with even more ruddy murder than their fellow space grabbers-partly because they have plenty of expensive fight ducats to dispense.

> But when Mr. Liston can be placed, even if innocently, in a position of denying that he's thinking of becoming a priest, we are either in Wonderland with Alice or in Florence with Machiavelli.

This religious rehabilitation jazz, in its context, is about as chic as a Holy Water font in a brothel.
